



Background

The ERC-funded research project LOOP examines society and culture in the region of Palestine at the turn of the 20th century as a particularly diverse and dynamic part of the eastern Mediterranean on the eve of the emergence of the modern Middle East. The main source of the project is about 1,000 Ottoman census registers covering the area of what later became Mandate Palestine and containing information on about 500,000 people.

The aim to extract large amounts of data from the available Ottoman population registers is one of the main challenges of the project. The LOOP team has therefore joined forces with the Digital Humanities Center at Ruhr-Universität and with Eliyahu Laboratory (eLijah-Lab), the digital humanities laboratory in the Department of Israeli History at the University of Haifa. Recently, the ISF-funded research project "The Jewish Colonies in Late Ottoman Palestine through the Prism of the 1905 Imperial Census" by Yuval Ben-Bassat of the University of Haifa joined these efforts.
